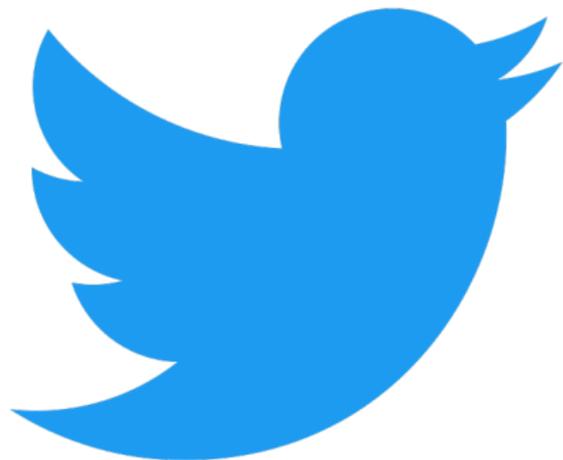

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Connections between language and personality

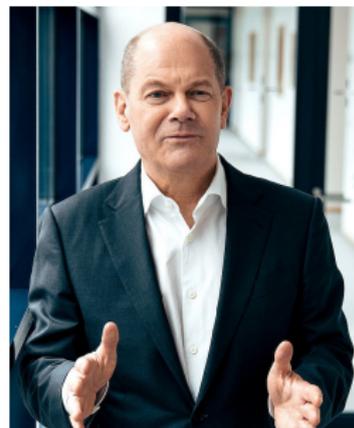


Rising amounts of text-data



Opportunities of text-analysis

- Allows assessment:
 - fast
 - in large scales (Obschonka et al. 2020)
 - for persons or groups difficult to access (Obschonka, Fisch, and Boyd 2017)



Our goal

- Develop and distribute Open-Source Open-Access Tool for Big Five Personality assessment from text

TV-show transcripts

- Freely available
- Large text corpus
- TV-show characters have personalities (Webster and Campbell 2021)

[Scene: *Central Perk*. Joey, Phoebe, Monica, and Chandler are there; Chandler is showing everyone his new computer.]

Chandler: All right, check out this bad boy. 12 megabytes of ram. 500 megabyte hard drive. Built-in spreadsheet capabilities and a modem that transmits at over 28,000 b.p.s.

Phoebe: Wow. What are you gonna use it for?

Chandler: [doggedly] Games and stuff.

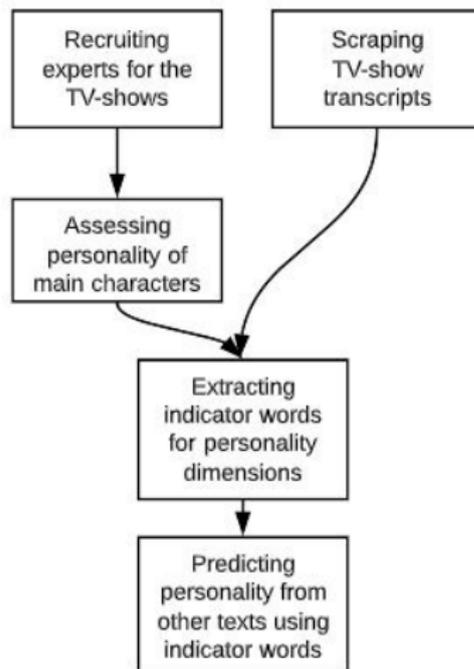

What we've done so far

- Looking at three shows:



- Scraping transcripts
- Assessing main character personality
 - Open Science Grant
 - Prolific
 - 300 rater per show

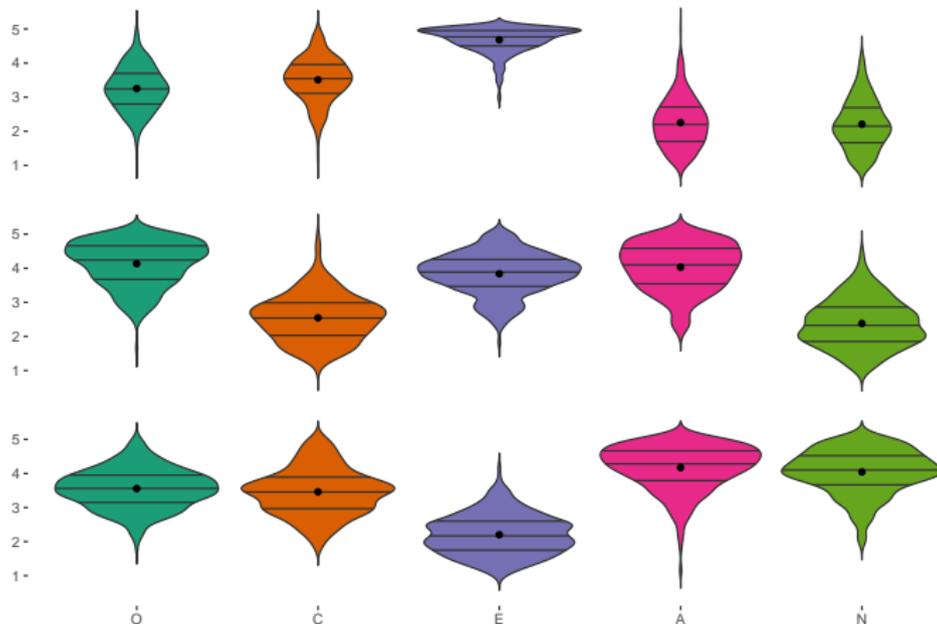


Preliminary results

- Psychometrically sound personality ratings
 - Factor analysis shows 5 factors reflecting Big Five
 - Excellent interrater agreement (ICCs range [.8, .99])



Personality measures



Violin plots of the expert ratings of the personality of the TV-show characters.
Horizontal lines are Quartiles and Median, dots are Mean.

O = Open-Mindedness, C = Conscientiousness, E = Extraversion, A = Agreeableness, N = Negative Emotionality

Conclusion

- Personality of TV-show characters is measurable
- (Some) meaningful correlations between words and personality
- Next steps
 - Larger data base
 - More sophisticated methods
